# WEDNESDAY NIGHT BIBLE CLASS

# JANUARY 31, 2024 GENESIS 50:15-21

#### INTRODUCTION:

- 1. The death of Jacob renewed the guilt of Joseph's brothers and complicated their relationship.
- 2. Our text provides an illustration of how we are to behave when sin separates brethren.

### I. THE BROTHERS EXPRESSED THEIR CONCERN

- A. There is Fear.
  - 1. **GENESIS 50.15:** "Perhaps Joseph will hate us, and may actually repay us"
  - 2. Three words are used to describe what the brothers did to Joseph.
    - a) Evil (ra): Moral evil and physical disaster. (Gen. 50.15,17,19; Isa. 5.20; 45.7).
    - b) Trespass (pesa): "Rebellion" [Mounce]. (Gen. 50.17)
    - c) Sin (hattat): "To miss the mark" [Vine]. A moral failure. (Gen. 50.17)
  - 3. When we mistreat someone, we are doing the same. (Matt. 5.43,45; 1 Cor. 8.13)
- B. There is Forgiveness.
  - 1. GENESIS 50.17: "I beg you, please forgive the trespass of your brothers and their sin"
  - 2. GENESIS 50.17: "Now, please, forgive the trespass of the servants"
  - 3. There is no greater gift than forgiveness. (2 Cor. 2.5-8)
    - a) Command: We are commanded to forgive. (Luke 17.4)
    - b) Condition: There are conditions that must be met. (Luke 17.4)
    - c) Condition: Receiving forgiveness is conditioned on our giving it. (Matt. 18.21,35)
- B. There is a Falling Down.
  - 1. **GENESIS 50.18:** "Then his brothers also went and fell down before his face"
    - a) "Fell down" translates the Hebrew word meaning "collapse" (cf. Gen. 50.1)
    - b) **GENESIS 50.18:** "and they said, 'Behold, we are your servants.'"
    - c) Servants (ebed): Literally, slaves. (cf. Ex. 13.3)
  - 2. **GENESIS 50.17:** "And Joseph wept when they spoke to him."

## II. JOSEPH EXPRESSED HIS LOVE

- A. Revenge: Joseph did not seek revenge.
  - 1. **GENESIS 50.19:** "Do not be afraid, for am I in the place of God?"
  - 2. In ancient Egyptian culture, Pharaoh was seen as a god. (Ex. 5.1,2)
  - 3. Taking vengeance is putting ourselves in the place of God. (Rom. 12.17-19)
- B. Resentment: Joseph did not resent them for what they did.
  - 1. **GENESIS 50.20:** "But as for you, you meant evil against me; but God meant it for good, in order to bring it about as it is this day, to save many people alive."
    - a) Evil: They meant to bring disaster into the life of Joseph.
    - b) Good: God allowed the events to unfold in order to benefit the world.
  - 2. Resentment will impede forgiveness ruin a relationship. (Eph. 4.31,32; Col. 3.19)
- C. Reception: Joseph received them as brethren.
  - 1. **GENESIS 50.21:** "Now therefore, do not be afraid; I will provide for you and your little ones." And he comforted them and spoke kindly to them."
    - a) Comforted: Joseph eased the mind of his brother's grief.
    - b) Spoke kindly: Joseph spoke to them from his heart.
  - 2. Do you go out of your way to let a brother know he is forgiven? (cf. Heb. 8.12)
